

This year the Unity week is guided by the churches of Burkina Faso, previously Upper Volta.

Their theme is the Parable of the Good Samaritan. They invite us to join with them in a process of self-reflection as they consider what it means to love our neighbour in the midst of a security crisis.

Communities in the British-Irish context may be less vulnerable to acts of mass violence than in Burkina Faso, but there are still many living with the memory and/or the threat of serious violence, centred on issues of identity and belonging. There are also groups within communities, including people from ethnic minority backgrounds and people seeking asylum, who feel particularly vulnerable to violence or being displaced by the threat of violence.

MARY ELIZABETH WAKEFORD

Mary was born in Worthing on 19th June 1928, the elder sister of Ann. She went to St Brandon's school, followed by Worthing High School, and in 1944 passed her school certificate, coming top in her year. She didn't stay on at school. She was discouraged by her father who said she'd end up as a teacher or a nurse, and most likely a spinster!

So she left school, joined the National Provincial Bank and then went on to work at a company called Sangers who sold pills and potions. Mary always enjoyed the outdoor life. Encouraged by her father she learnt to play golf from a young age. She enjoyed swimming, especially in the sea. She loved travelling and went youth hostelling around the country with her bike, visiting the Lake District and Scotland. Whilst staying at Dover Youth Hostel she met a young Norwegian.....a 'lovely chap'. However, following a holiday in Norway she decided Norway wasn't for her and regretfully wrote him a 'Dear John' letter.

She met her husband, Eric, at a 21st birthday party and they were married in October 1951. After a honeymoon in Paris they moved into their first home in Chichester. Their eldest son, Richard, was born in 1953, they adopted William in 1958 and Elizabeth was born in 1959. In 1958 they moved first to Portsmouth and then, in 1960, they bought their shop in Petworth. Initially, they lived above the shop but needing more space they moved to Tillington in 1968. As their children left home they looked at moving back into Petworth and in 1980 bought their forever home in Rosemary Lane.

Mary involved herself in the local community. She regularly attended St Mary's church in Petworth and All Hallows in Tillington. She and Eric were keen supporters of the Family Support Work's Knowles Tooth Centre and between 1991 - 2006 they participated in their annual sponsored walk along the South Downs Way. When the outdoor swimming pool was built in Petworth she joined Petworth Swimming Club and qualified as a swimming teacher. She taught swimming at the club for over forty years. She always believed children should have fun whilst learning a vital skill, and was keen to encourage adult non-swimmers to learn too.

On moving to Tillington she joined the WI, becoming President on several occasions. She helped to run the WI Market in Petworth Town Hall until its demise. She was a keen allotment holder and enjoyed growing vegetables. She took up bee keeping and was very disappointed when it proved impractical to keep them when she and Eric moved back into Petworth.

Mary always liked travelling and she and Eric were both keen participants of the Petworth Twinning Association. She loved to take every opportunity to practise her French, and in later years enjoyed using duolingo on her laptop.

She was always interested in learning new skills and made a point of signing up for Evening Classes every year. She attended a variety of classes including woodwork, cookery, pottery and, of course, French. She tried out Yoga but wasn't too keen on the meditation elements!

When Eric passed away in 2010 she continued to enjoy the best life she could. She took up keep fit and art classes, and enjoyed coach holidays with her friend Min. Unfortunately, in 2014 she broke her ankle in a car accident and had to learn to walk again. Not an easy thing to do at 86! However, she prevailed.

In August 2020 she moved to Barlavington. She survived catching Covid in November but, sadly, following a hospital stay in May 2021, she was forced to move to Pendean, near Midhurst. Although always reluctant to give up her independence, she still made the most of life. In recent months her health further deteriorated and she died on 13th October. Not long before her death she declared, 'I've had a good life!'

A Busy Autumn

What a term we have had so far at MRC! As Assistant Principal for Raising Standards, I am proud to tell you about this term and our plans for the New Year. As a school, we choose our values together with the students. Our values of achievement, happiness, and respect guide us in all we do, so I would like to tell you about life at college, focusing on each of our values in action.

Achievement: In August we celebrated with the outgoing GCSE and A level students, who achieved our best results ever. We very soon welcomed a lively new



cohort of Year 7 students into college and everyone moved up to a new school year. I manage the academic side of Year 11, a challenging ten months for all, leading to around thirty public examinations per student each summer. This year we are using morning tutor times to boost progress through master-classes in GCSE subjects. Our students' progress is assessed every half-term, after which they are moved to the tutor group addressing gaps in their skills or knowledge. Students have impressed us with great efforts early each morning in masterclasses, in lessons and exams. On 12th December, students will experience a 'Results Day' after which there

Constantly improving GCSE results enable more students to stay on at MRC sixth form and study for A levels. We are thrilled to have a growing sixth form. Our students enjoy great facilities, take on leadership roles and serve as excellent role-models for younger students, before moving onto a great range of degree courses and career paths.

Lower down the school, we have fostered fluency in languages, offering a range of subjects through French since 2020. In CLiL lessons, students learn geography, science, music, art and/or cookery through French, to build fluency beyond conventional MFL lessons. Our first CLiL students are ready for early entry GCSE next summer, outperforming older linguists!

To stretch our most able pupils, from September 2023, we will be creating a grammar stream, one class per year group, which students will compete to get into and stay in. Exciting times ahead.

Happiness: We offer education with character, seeking to develop the whole person as children move up through the school, nurturing known talents or interests and fostering new ones. Our programme of enrichment allows children to choose to discover new things such as learning Welsh, trying out French cookery, playing chess, putting on a play, debating a hot topic or rehearsing with the

school orchestra, amongst other things. This term, we have held a wonderful concert, and a great performance of the musical 'Waitress' from Year 13 performing arts students, ably supported by younger actors. We were pleased to welcome 3,000 visitors onto campus for the wonderful Fireworks Night this month. This autumn MRC students have travelled to Normandy and California for study trips, and closer to home for 'Go Ape', cross country running, rugby, opera at Glyndebourne and 'The Life of Pi' at Chichester Festival Theatre, to mention just some of the activities that

Respect: At college we teach our students to respect and care for others. We listen to learners' opinions at our student council, diversity and LGBGTQ groups. We mark important occasions like Founders' Day at the Parish Church and Remembrance Day here in school. Each House supports a chosen charity through fundraising events like the recent fancy dress competition and the sponsored walk, which sixth form leaders often run. This month, many students and staff are itching to reach the end of Movember and shave off the moustaches, they are growing for charity! We are regular supporters of the Midhurst Food Bank too. There is lots in store for 2024 as we continue to provide a rich and varied education for young people from a very wide catchment area, including those of the local community.





Holly

I'm sure you'll agree that these are crazy times, folks. Back in Ancient Rome they had a festival - Saturnalia - which saw their society turn upside down for a week each December. It seems Saturnalia's traditions of chaos and mayhem are now the daily norm for us Brits but, as we career towards Christmas, we have another thing in common with Saturnalia. We will soon be paying our respects to the Holly tree.



Holly has been celebrated in many traditions over the centuries because, as a native evergreen, its vibrancy in the dead of winter could easily be mistaken for immortality. Holly was the sacred tree of Saturn, the Roman god of agriculture. In pagan tradition, the Holly King ruled over the Oak King from Midsummer to Midwinter. Holly was easily adopted by Christians, who saw many links between the tree and the life of Christ. Today, Holly remains a centrepiece of our Christmas decorations, cards and cakes.



Each Holly tree is either male or female. While both produce delicate white flowers in May, it's only the female Holly that bears a berry as red as any blood. When these berries are produced in profusion, it's taken to be a sign of an oncoming hard winter - although in reality it's the outcome of a successful spring. Holly's prickles provide protection for nesting birds, their flower buds are food for the Holly Blue butterfly's caterpillar and their ripe berries are essential for thrushes.

If you're after a tree filled with folklore then Holly must take a bow. So if you're planning to deck your halls with boughs of the stuff this Christmas, here's a quick user guide. First off, *never* cut down a Holly tree - that's guaranteed bad luck, a superstition which has spared many Holly trees from the woodsman's axe.

And make sure you leave Holly trees in your hedgerows to prevent witches from running along the top. If you bring Holly into your home at Christmas, it'll help protect you from those pesky festive faeries. Only female Holly leaves under your pillow will allow you to predict your future in your dreams. Oh, and don't forget to get rid of your Holly decorations before Twelfth Night (but don't burn them, that's bad luck too). Holly trees will protect you against lightning strikes (I'm not sure if this has been scientifically proven so don't blame me if you still



get zapped). And don't eat the berries, they're poisonous, but if you have small-pox you can drink an infusion made from the leaves.

Stick to those rules folks and you'll have a peaceful Christmas. Me? I've had enough of the state of the world today. I'm going to pour some wine, put on my toga and pretend I'm in ancient Rome. Somebody pass me my fiddle.



Harvest Festival donations

We have been fortunate to receive an amazing amount of harvest festival donations this year from schools and churches. This is wonderful because we tend to see donations drop off considerably in the summer and this replenishes our stock as we start to hit our busiest time of the year. Thank you to all those who have organised and donated for harvest festival. Your generosity is very much appreciated.

Finding a way out of crisis

As a Trussell Trust foodbank, Chichester District Foodbank (which includes Petworth) is very much focused on helping people out of their crisis so that they no longer need to turn to a foodbank. What this means is that as well as providing three days' worth of emergency food, we also refer people to organisations that may be able to help our clients in other ways. This may be a local organisation or a national one or a combination of both.

Such is the need for help that we now have a Citizens Advice worker attached to the Chichester District Foodbank. The range of issues that our Citizens Advice worker can help with include benefits, housing, debt, utility bills and many others. For example, a client may be about to have their gas and electricity cut off so quick intervention is vital. Or a family in low paid work may be entitled to more universal credit than they're receiving or financial difficulties may have led to unmanaged debt.

When these types of problems overwhelm, it can cause a downward spiral and people can find it very difficult to move through their crisis. In the midst of such difficulty, it is also hard to know where to turn particularly if you don't have a computer or smart phone to search for the right kind of support. At Petworth foodbank, our telephone signposting team are able to let clients know where those sources of help can be found as well as a making a referral to our Citizens Advice worker as appropriate.

Would you like to be a volunteer signposter?

We are looking for a couple more people to join our team of signposters. The role is home-based but you'll definitely be part of our Petworth team. Training is provided. You need to be IT literate, with a good telephone manner and be able to offer a morning a week of your time (we particularly need to cover Monday morning at present but there is flexibility on the day). The hours are 09.30 to 12.30 on your chosen morning but you do not need to sit by the phone all that time!

Who is Santa Claus? Art from St Nicholas to Father Christmas By Christopher Bradley

CHRISTOPHER BRADLEY has a broad range of lecturing experience, including to the Royal Geographical Society and the Royal Institute of British Architects. As a film producer and cameraman he has made documentaries for the BBC, National Geographic TV and Channel 4.

Nicholas was the Greek Bishop of Myra, a 4th century port in Anatolia. Following his death, his legendary generosity established him as the principle gift-giving saint as well as the patron saint of seafarers. The body of St Nicholas was stolen by Italian sailors to protect their own ports in the Adriatic. Over the centuries the image of St Nicholas changed constantly until the Dutch re-invented him as Sinterklaas. Taking him to their new colonies in America, he transformed into kindly Santa Claus. Later re-imported into Britain without his Catholic baggage, he gradually emerged as Father Christmas







FUNERALS

We remember with thanksgiving the recently departed

With the recent passing of MARY WAKEFORD and ROSEMARY HARRIS, St Mary's has lost two devoted and loyal members of its congregation.

MARY had been resident at Pendean Nursing Home and passed away there on 13th October at the age of 95 years.

Born in Worthing on 19th June 1928, she married Eric in October 1951 and set up their first home in Chichester.

Their first child, Richard was born in 1952, five years later they adopted William and Elisabeth arrived in 1959.

In 1960 they bought the shop premises in Market Square where they lived above the shop before moving to Tillington some 8 years later. In 1980 Eric and Mary moved back to Petworth, purchasing Rosemary Cottage.

Mary was much involved in the community, being associated with the Women's Institute at both Tillington and Petworth, the WI Market, the Twinning Association and the Swimming Club where she qualified as a teacher and, for over forty years, taught countless numbers of children how to swim.

Along with Eric, they supported Family Social Work and between 1991 and 2006 they participated in the annual sponsored walk along the South Downs Way.

After Eric passed away in 2010 she took up keep fit and art classes as well as taking coach holidays.

A person of deep faith, Mary regularly attended St Mary's at the 8.00 am service on Sunday, latterly with the help of her walking frame, but when this became too much she received her communion at home.

In August 2020 she moved to Barlavington Nursing Home but after a stay in hospital she was relocated to Pendean.

Her funeral service at St Mary's on 16th November was followed by burial at Hampers Green cemetery.

It was in 1987 when **ROSEMARY** along with Raymond arrived in Petworth on a house hunting mission.

They came across Somerset Lodge in North Street and decided to buy the property, which was in need of considerable restoration. Two years later they finally moved into their new home, having sold their house in London.

They soon became drawn into the active life of the town, helping the expanding Festival, joining the church choir.

With Raymond's experience as an architect, (Rosemary had also been one), he was involved in restoration work on the Leconfield Hall.

Meanwhile, Rosemary became Secretary of PACT, arranged Alpha Courses at her home and later as a Lay Assistant held regular Communion services at the Cottage Nursing Home. She was a strong supporter of organisations that worked with persecuted Christians through the world.

Rosemary held firm views on many subjects, on one occasion she was highly critical of the Somerfield supermarket when it began opening for Sunday trading.

She took much pride in her garden which had featured in the House & Garden magazine, as well as a number of other publications. It was open to the public as part of the National Gardens Scheme and also to support local charities.

Widowed 8 years ago, she continued her regular attendance at St Mary's on Sundays until shortly before her death.

Rosemary passed away at her home on 1st November at the age of 93 years. Her funeral service was held at St Mary's on 30th November.

BRYAN JOHN HILL was in born in a cottage in Pound Street to parents, Arnold and Ella Hill, who had originated from the north of England. They later moved to South Grove and Bryan started work for W Bryder & Sons a week before his 15th birthday. Having developed his trade as a carpenter he would remain with the firm throughout his working life. In addition, he assisted with funerals until he was 80.

Married to Doreen the couple had two sons, Andrew and Graham, and had lived at Hampers Green.

Tragedy struck the family when, in 1975, Andrew who had been involved in a road accident, sadly passed away at the age of 16 years after being in a coma for some 18 months.

Bryan suffered health problems in the latter part of his life, and was supported by Doreen in difficult circumstances.

He passed away on 7th October and the funeral took place at Worthing crematorium on 1st November.

MELVYN BRIDGER grew up at Hampers Green, the only son of Owen and Hannah. From a young age he joined the Scout movement, an interest he held throughout his life.

A carpenter by trade, he prepared background scenery for many of the Petworth Players productions over the years.

Married to Kathy, they had two sons, Shaun and Gareth.

A few years ago, the couple moved from their home in Downview Road to live in the Bognor area.

Melvyn passed away on 16th October at the age of 77 years.

His funeral took place on 6th November at the Arun Crematorium at Yapton.

JEAN ELSIE BAINBRIDGE had been a resident in Petworth for over 30 years. She became Warden for the residents living at Thompsons Hospital and Egremont Almshouses, living in one of the Egremont units where she transformed her garden, which attracted much praise from visitors. Sadly, her husband, Francis passed away in 1995.

Since 2002, Jean had lived at Thompsons Hospital.

She passed away at St Richards hospital on 21st October at the age of 82 years. Her Committal service took place at Chichester crematorium on 23rd November.

WEST SUSSEX COUNTY COUNCIL

I have mentioned many times before about the new Special Needs School called Woodlands Mead at East Grinstead area. This is only part of the work we do with Schools for Special Needs children. OFSTED will have been with us by the time you read these notes, and by January I should know how well we are doing and where we need to make improvements. We have certainly put time and money into improving this Service.

Our Footpath and Rights of Way team are doing their best to keep up to the schedule they have for checking the state of our Rights of Way, but the weather we have encountered has not made this an easy job. On that same subject we have erected a new Bridge between Wisborough Green and Billingshurst, we were due to visit it but the weather has again put a stop to that.

Lady Emma Barnard, Lord Lieutenant, is officially opening the new Fire and Rescue Centre at Broadbridge Heath on 28th November.

On the same subject I recently visited Petworth's retained Fire and Rescue Station. They're doing a great job, when I was there training with breathing apparatus was taking place. All those doing the course, which is over 3 days, passed. There is still a need for retained Firemen.

We still do need prospective foster parents to come forward. There is an event between the hours of 8.00 am and 2.00 pm on the 5th and 6th of December. On the 5th December it will be at County Hall Chichester, and on the 6th at County Hall North in Horsham. West Sussex is now an accredited Fostering Friendly employer. There is also a bonus of £750 for a scheme called 'referafriend' and, if they become an approved Foster Carer, they also receive a bonus of £750.
