





A meeting of the Parochial Church Council (PCC) was held on Wednesday 24th January

The minutes of the PCC meeting held on 22nd November 2023 were approved.

Finance: There was little to report regarding the finances. Eileen was awaiting the year-end figures from Tulip. We were also waiting for year-end figures regarding our investments, the latter however was not money for us to spend. There is $\pm 14,652$ in CAF and just over $\pm 29,000$ in Santander. We will have made a loss, though less than last year, but until the figures are received Eileen could not put a figure on it.

St Mary's Fabric: There was no further update.

2024 Quinquennial: Jane Warner Jones has retired. We therefore need a new Architect. Richard Andrews, who also looks after Egdean, would be willing to work for St Mary's. The Quinquennial is carried out every 5 years. Richard is known by the Diocese and is on the DAC. The PCC approved the appointment.

2024 Visitation: Arch-Deacon Luke would be visiting. The Charity Commission says we are overdue with the financial return for 2022. Father Mark is trying to resolve.

The Bell Tower: Andrew Brook is to be asked if he would lead on the work for the Bell Tower and be willing to report as and when to the PCC Secretary.

In Transoxiana, at the hub of the Great Silk Road, are some of the loveliest historic cities of Central Asia. Bukhara, the 'Dome of Islam', was for centuries a leading centre for artists and scholars. Its emirs resided in the austere Ark Fortress, as old as the city itself. Samarkand was the glorious capital of the ruthless conqueror Tamerlaine, who is buried in a stunningly beautiful mausoleum, beneath a brilliant blue fluted dome. Khiva, which grew rich in the 19C, boasts one of the most homogeneous collections of Islamic architecture, a museum city, frozen in time.



Slindon College, near Arundel, has achieved the School Mental Health Award, delivered by the Carnegie Centre of Excellence for Mental Health in Schools. Slindon College was awarded a Silver standard for its outstanding mental health and wellbeing provision.

Headteacher at Slindon College, Sotiria Vlahodimou said: 'We are delighted to receive this award and the recognition that goes with it for our hardworking team who are so very skilled and experienced at looking after our pupils' mental fitness. Each pupil at Slindon College is supported and nurtured to ensure their personal development and all round wellbeing.'

Slindon College provides a wide range of activities to boost the wellbeing of pupils and staff, including weekly woodland walks, time to talk sessions, termly wellbeing focussed staff meetings and a range of events that support the college community's mental fitness including the Slindon Memory Tree which encouraged pupils to reflect and journal their feelings in a safe space.

Slindon College SENCo and Mental Fitness Lead, Adam Sharpe said: 'The award process has helped us to recognise just how much we do to support the mental health of those in our College community. It provided an excellent framework to improve the ways we can monitor wellbeing and adapt the support we offer to our pupils. The award has also been a catalyst for the College to look beyond Slindon House and at how we can support other local settings to improve their mental health provision and share good practice.'

To achieve the Silver Standard Carnegie Award, a school's mental health provision needs to be having an impact at a local and regional level. Slindon College's SENCo has visited local primary schools to deliver sessions to pupils on mental fitness and share information with local Headteachers on how the College is helping to improve the mental fitness of staff.

Sotiria Vlahodimou (Headteacher) has written nationally published articles on aspects of education that directly impact mental health. She also led a workshop on engaging reluctant learners (with a focus on Mental Health) at Chichester University's SEN conference 2023: Engaging Voices for Change in Inclusive Education.

The Carnegie Centre of Excellence for Mental Health in Schools aims to strengthen pupils' mental health by supporting schools to make a positive change at all levels of the UK's education system, improving students' outcomes and life chances.

Rachel C. Boyle, Dean of Leeds Beckett's Carnegie School of Education, said: 'The achievement of the Mental Health Award is a demonstration of the school's significant commitment to improving children's and staff's mental health and wellbeing.'

Dean Johnstone, founder and CEO of Minds Ahead said: 'This award shines a light on the excellent work schools are doing to promote mental health for their community of children and adults. The Wheatear by Michael Blencowe for Sussex Wildlife Trust

It's been a long winter, but rest assured that our summer migrant birds will soon be with us. As you read this, beating hearts and beating wings are powering tiny bodies through north African skies.

Wheatears are our earliest returning African migrants. It's a fast 3,000-mile flight from sub-Saharan Sierra Leone to Sussex for a 1-ounce Wheatear, and they've been recorded migrating at 500 miles a day. The dashing males arrive first, their soft, sun-bleached shades of pink and buff topped with a dapper black bandit's mask. At Sussex Wildlife Trust's Southerham nature reserve near Lewes, you'll see them scurrying over the grazed downland turf or perched along the valley's fence lines. When they fly, Wheatears flash the white rump which gives them their name. Because Wheatears have nothing to do with wheat or ears. Their original name...well, courtesy prevents me from writing their old English name in such an upstanding



publication - but let's just say they were named after their white behinds. Victorians and vicars bird watching in mixed company blushed when they were called upon to identify one, so their name was subtly censored.


Wheatear is a more palatable name for a tragically palatable bird. In Sussex, Wheatears were considered a local delicacy and were served at the finest banquets in Lewes, Brighton and Eastbourne. Sussex shepherds would trap them to increase their income; in the late Century the birds fetched 3/6d a dozen (£17.50 today). Shepherds could earn £14 per season (£1,260 today) trapping Wheatears - half their annual wage. Around the town, shepherds were eventually banned from trapping Wheatears as it distracted them from their sheep.

Gluttonous gourmets were so desperate for fresh Wheatear that they would prowl the downs and take birds straight from unmanned traps, leaving a pile of coins for the shepherds. In 1900, outspoken and outraged Sussex conservationist W.H Hudson wrote, 'It is not fair that Wheatears should be killed merely to enable London stockbrokers, sporting men, and other gorgeous persons who visit the coast, accompanied by ladies with yellow hair, to feed on them at the big Brighton hotels.' But the damage was done. Trapping and the gradual loss of their sheep-grazed downland habitat caused the birds to disappear from the Sussex downs. The Wheatears we now see around Lewes unsurprisingly don't hang around. Each spring they briefly return to their old downland haunts, flash their behinds at the people of Sussex and keep on moving. From Lewes, they'll head onwards



to breeding sites in northern England and northern Europe. But for some of these birds, their amazing migration continues for a further 2,000 miles across cold oceans to Greenland and Arctic Canada.

THE ANNUAL PETWORTH PARK ANTIQUES & FINE ART FAIR OPENS FOR THE TENTH YEAR RUNNING

Friday 17th to Sunday 19th May



The Petworth Park Antiques & Fine Art Fair returns for three days in May to the grounds of the National Trust's Petworth House, Petworth, West Sussex from Friday 17th to Sunday 19th May. Unusually, this event has taken place successfully every year since its inception, despite having to move dates on more than one occasion, last year as a result of King Charles III's coronation. Even in 2020 and 2021, when the fair had to move months to take place safely during the pandemic, this fair has always been extremely well attended by collectors, interior designers, south of England residents and others from around the UK and abroad. Brilliantly supported by the local market town, which looks forward to this annual event with much anticipation, the businesses in Petworth put on a great show for the influx of visitors and this year will be no exception. With some 60 exhibitors are gathering in the purpose-built marquee with their latest and finest stock.

MIDHURST ROTHER COLLEGE

Year 12 and 13 students studying A level Economics and A level Politics took a day trip to London to visit the Houses of Parliament and the Bank of England. They enjoyed a full tour of Parliament and were able to sit in on sessions in the House of Commons and House of Lords to observe the government in business action. Among the notable faces they saw during their visit were Penny Mordant, Leader of the House of Commons, Lord David Blunkett and Barley, his guide dog. Outside the building they were shown unrestored part of the exterior walls, which bare shrapnel and bomb damage scars from bombing during World War 2. The tour included passage through the oldest part of the Palace, Westminster Hall, familiar to most as where our late Queen's lying in state took place in 2022. Crossing London by underground, they then made their way to the Bank of England for a talk about Monetary Policy and the history of the Bank of England. They paid a visit the Bank's museum where students were challenged to pick up a real gold bullion weighing 13kg. The day finished with a walk back to Waterloo taking in many sights of the capital enroute. Overall the students had an excellent day taking in the inner workings of Parliament, seeing for themselves how the Bank of England works both bringing to life their A level courses studies to date.

WEST SUSSEX COUNTY COUNCIL AND THE SOUTHDOWNS NATIONAL PARK

As mentioned both the County Council and South Downs National Park are looking to recruit new Chief Executives and, at County, we also have to recruit a new Finance Director as she has obtained a position with a London Borough. We are very sorry to see her depart. She has left no stone unturned to see that we produced a balanced budget and, working with the Cabinet Member, and indeed all the West Sussex Staff, this has been achieved with no cuts to our Services. Because of a late extra Grant from central Government we do not have to touch reserves either, and our budget will balance without.

It gets more and more difficult with, as you know, many demands on our finances, the biggest of which are Adult Services and Young Persons Services, including children in care, SEND education and many other factors. Still, we've made it again for the 2024/25 Council Plan and Budget, plus of course our Capital Strategy.

As ever I have been busy at the National Park, mainly with Planning issues. You will know the Park stretches from Winchester in the west to Eastbourne in the east and I seem to have spent a lot of time on site visits which take a whole day in places like Beachy Head and Lewes. Although undeniably interesting it does involve a lot of time and travel but I've found out a lot about the County I was born and bred in over the last few years, and I have to say visited some Parishes I didn't know existed before.

Sadly, the weather has not let us complete all the projects on highways, etc. that we would like. No sooner do you get a road or right of way cleared than another rainfall comes along, more trees come down, roads flood making it sometimes difficult for people to move around as they would like. I can assure all residents that as soon as I am aware of any problems I report them to the appropriate departments, but as you can imagine with 70 Councillors trying to get help in our divisions when problems arise they don't all get attended to immediately, but we are trying.

Some of our village schools need help and their finances are tight. Loxwood at the moment is particularly in need of assistance which we are all working hard to help with, and I'm hoping to get some good news soon.

It has been asked why can't CIL (Community Infrastructure Levy) or S106 money be used to help, but this money comes with development and some of the items that are required do not meet the requirements for either of these pots of money. However, I am not unhopeful that we can find a solution because we have some great schools in the rural villages I represent. It was said at a meeting recently that a local town looking at a possible influx of 1,000 houses would enable them to get a Secondary School. This is absolutely not the case and even if there was a chosen site it would need many more than 1,000 houses to even touch what the cost of building a new Secondary School would be. A close eye is kept by departments on the amount of development around the County so they know when and if they need to look at developing a new school. This would most likely be an Academy, as County is not allowed to build a new school, only carry out developments on the sites they already maintain. Governments expect Academy's to build new, Counties have a say but don't carry out the build.

March and Spring are with you by this time and I really do hope we can look forward to better weather when we can all really enjoy this beautiful part of the world. I for one am fed up with being constantly rained on. Take care especially if driving in bad weather conditions and flood.
