

ST MARY'S RIDE AND STRIDE

Chichester Walk mark 3!! (September 9th)

I only decided to 'stride' about a week before The Ride and Stride (in aid of the Sussex Historic Churches Trust and our Church), so it was a rush to get sponsors for the event. As I don't like to do the same visits each year, I had already thought about how I could vary what I had done the last 2 times.

As I was not having lifts to Chichester this year I knew I would be restricted by the timing of the busses. I thought that I may be able to add something to the North of the main city, and as the bus was to approach via Lavant I looked at the Summersdale area. Catching the 10.10 am to Midhurst the connection with the service 60 was good, and I disembarked at The Broadway, to make my way to **St Michael, Summersdale Road.** Interestingly this Church was built in 1931 and paid for by the Misses Peacock, apparently to save them having to go by taxi each Sunday to St Paul's at Northgate! There was an art class in the building, so I could not go in, but the sign-in sheet was outside.



Turning south again I headed to Blomfield Drive running along the northern edge of the open area of Havenstoke Park and on to **Graylingwell Chapel**.





An Early English style building built in 1897, the architect being Arthur Blomfield. When I last visited on the Ride and Stride many years ago it was being used by Immanuel Church, but it is now owned and managed by Chichester Community Development Trust and has been converted into a community space and café.

As well as a children's play area and meeting rooms it houses an exhibition about the history of Graylingwell Asylum. I rested here a little, and had a refreshing soft drink in the café. On leaving the café I travelled south of the park on Connolly Way to get to Oaklands Park. I did not want to take the roads to Northgate so I cut through the park via the rugby club, and eventually came out on the main road by the Festival theatre entrance.





A few yards down the road was **St Bartholomew's Hospital Chapel**, which I have only seen open once. It was an Alms House chapel built in 1625 by Cawley - one of the only 2 buildings to the north of the city prior to 1769. The Alms House was housing for 12 'poor and aged persons', 6 of each sex.






Across the road on the roundabout sits **St Paul's**, built in 1836 as a satellite to St Peter the Great in the city centre, though it then became the main church (more of this later!). Now I entered the city walls to book in at the **Providence Chapel** in Chapel Street. It was opened in 1809 for a congregation of dissenters of Calvinistic persuasion, and contains its original fittings and is still in use. English Heritage assisted with its restoration in 1989. I crossed North Street to Priory Park (the site of the Franciscan friary, Greyfriars). The building in the park is the Priory Church which was built by 1287, but became the city's town hall (**The Guildhall**) in 1541. It is now a museum. Last year I discovered a nice little café near the edge of the park, and this year I made this my lunch stop.





Just outside the park is the modern **Friends Meeting House** built on the site of an earlier Quaker Meeting House of 1700. It was one of four sites where there were welcoming people on duty. In St Martin's Square I was disappointed to find **St Mary's Hospital** closed, and no sign-in sheet available as it was on the list of sites open. It is one of my favourite Chichester churches. No medieval hospital in England has retained its original character as much as this one. Just around the corner is **St Martin's garden**. This is the site of the Church of St. Martin's or St. Martin's in Hoggelane or the Pig Market which dates from 1260. It was united with St Olave in North Street, and was in disrepair by 1906 and was pulled down. The garden is on the site of the original church.

Within the car park by Marks and Spencer is the 13th century **St Andrew Oxmarket** which is another redundant Church It suffered bomb damage in 1943, and is now an arts centre. I was interested to see modern etchings on the glass of three windows.







I was determined to go to another of my favourites near the eastern end of East Street, so I headed that way, detouring into Baffins Lane to sign in at **Baffins** Hall – now Henry Adams. A Presbyterian chapel, it dates after 1671, originally privately owned (for Church use) but bought by a congregational trust in 1721. Now on to **St John the Evangelist** in St John's Street. I have talked about the interior of this building in previous years - a lovely example of a Georgian Church.

As I was beginning to tire I headed back to the centre to my last 4 venues. St Faith on Cathedral Green is a ruin dating originally from the 11th century, but converted into a dwelling house in the 16th. St Peter the Great (now The Duke and Rye) is opposite the Cathedral in West Street. This Church (which was where the Cathedral is now) was the Mother Church of the city, and the parish originally stretched north to Lavant. When the Cathedral was moved from Selsey the Church was housed in the North Transept of the new building. The present building was constructed in 1852. As the population increased St Paul (mentioned earlier) was constructed as a chapel of ease. In 1979 St Peter was made redundant because of dwindling congregations and the need for major repair as well as the proximity of the Cathedral, and St Paul took over as the Parish Church.

Although the building was closed, my penultimate visit was the **Bishop's Chapel**. Unfortunately I have only found it open once through the years. Of course, my last call was the **Cathedral**. I have talked about it many times in the past, and, of course, it is well known.

With relief - but satisfied - I went to the bus stop just outside to wait for my trip home. Initially I was concerned about the hot weather, but the area north of the city was nicely tree lined, and, of course, within the city I had the shade provided by the buildings.

Enormous 'Thank you' to all who have sponsored Lewis (on his ride) and me. Half of the money we have raised will come back to our Church.

ST MARY THE VIRGIN, PETWORTH

A meeting of the Parochial Church Council (PCC) was held on Wednesday 27th September

Co-option to the Council: Di Parr was co-opted to the PCC, proposed by Andrew Howard and seconded by Jean Huggett.

The minutes of the PCC Meeting held on 5th July were approved.

Sarah Rogers attended the meeting to talk about Stewardship.

We need to project a motivation for giving, such as keeping the building maintained. Be transparent and show what the money is being used for, specific needs are inclined to bring money in.

The Revd Andrew Smith is the Diocesan Advisor on Generous Giving and would work with us. He can help raise the giving.

Use donations to raise money for specific items.

Look at the Church of England website to gain ideas.

Work towards attracting legacies. People are more likely to leave the church money when being asked directly to consider doing so. Some may wish to say specifically for what they are leaving it.

One way of easy fund raising are charity shopping sites to which you can sign up. Ask family members to also sign up naming the church even if they do not attend.

Be up front, ask people at weddings and funerals to donate electronically. Have someone tap the electronic donation hub and others will follow.

When we have events at the church and collections are taken ask that half goes to their chosen charity and half to the church.

Always make sure people are thanked for their giving.

Put up a notice to say what our expenses are such as heating, light, etc.

We can claim gift aid for any donation up to £30 without signature.

Create a small group to look at fund raising.

An update on St Mary's Finances: It was felt that the Tulip papers were not easily understandable. We would also like to know this year's expenditure as opposed to last year. This would help establish trends in our main expenses, apart from the stipend and heating. The PCC therefore asked for clarification of the finances. Eileen would ask for a meeting with Tulip and discuss it with Nick.

Visiting Organist fees: Matthew wonders if we should we consider putting up the visiting organist fees, to £75. This was accepted and was proposed by Andrew Howard and seconded by Jean Huggett.

St Mary's MAP: This is ongoing.

St Mary's Fabric: Nick Wheeler's report was circulated. The new mat at the South door needs attention as it is rising up. The window used for access to the roof is to be mended.

Flagpole: it was reported that Mark Thompson was concerned that the flagpole had still not been erected, as he had raised money from the businesses for it. There had been a request that it was placed back on the tower and someone be employed to put it up and take down. This was not felt to be sustainable.

The Terrier inventory of our church was overdue. One of the books from NAD-FAS the Art Society, was missing. Eileen would check with Jackie Smith and Lord Egremont.

The Quinquennial will be due in 2024, and we will need to employ a new architect following the retirement of Jane Jones-Warner.

Updates were received on:

Safeguarding: there was no further update

Pastoral Care: Rotherlea would like a monthly communion. Jill Easton would take a lead.

PACT: Lecture next Friday. Spring and Autumn arranged for next year. Coffee mornings ware going well

The Deanery Synod had met at Graffham last week. They talked at length about climate, and what can the church do to help. Next month here we have a meeting with Diocesan reps talking about the Diocese financial situation.

Family Support: Monday drop in is going well, mainly referred families attend. Plans to open an after-school group are being looked at. There was good Orchard Close support.

St Mary's Music: There was no further update.

St Mary's Voluntary Charitable Contributions: We have for the many years given 1% of our parish pledge to FSW, and 0.1% to PACT. This equates to approx. £400. It was debated whether we should either pay as usual, or do a specific fund raising event for FSW instead. It was agreed that we would pay this year as usual but, because other parishes are questioning the way we all give, put it on the agenda for discussion at the next Deanery Synod.

Father Mark's remarks: A complaint had been made about the hazel trees along Barton Lane, that they were overhanging. The Diocese won't pay to have them pruned; might the PCC pay? It was felt that our church couldn't afford it either. Fr Mark would ask the if the Leconfield estate would kindly help.

The Junior church corner was looking good, and breakfast on the first Sunday was to take place again. Our thanks to the Parr family! Parents and Toddlers was also going well under Jackie's leadership.

Children's Society: Jackie Smith has been doing the boxes for many years, and would now like to stop. It had become too difficult to bank the coin. Jackie would collect this year but stop after that. Would someone else be prepared to take it on?

Christingle would again happen together with the Crib service, which had been so successful last year. Should the Christmas Nativity exhibition continue to take place? Eileen would check whether the school would still be like to be involved, if so, we would go ahead. Jackie would like it to remain in St Thomas's Chapel from the first weekend in December.

All Souls service would be on Sunday 29th October at 4.00 pm. We would let the Festival know in future they cannot book an event on Sunday 3rd November during the afternoon.

Slugs

I've had a strange fascination with slugs since I was a little boy. Back then I believed that they were homeless snails that had lost their shells. It turns out I was right. Sort of. The whole eviction process had started as far back as the murky Mesozoic when some land snails cast off the shackles of a shell and evolved into slugs for some truly independent living. Sure, shells are great for protection and will help you to avoid drying out but they're clunky and require calcium to construct. Without them you can roam anywhere and (to namecheck another mollusc) the world's your oyster.

The slug's shell has never been completely lost - a fragment remains hidden under their skin, a tiny, shrunken souvenir of their snail ancestry. Another link to their slimy dynasty is that all slugs, like all snails, are both male and female. As hermaphrodites, they possess both sets of sexual organs and this means that, if the situation dictates, they can go it alone and simply self-fertilise to produce their offspring. A true state of independence.

Self-fertilisation creates a clone - or in a slug's case hundreds of clones - but the problem with inbreeding is a lack of genetic variability. Clones all possess the same weaknesses. An entire slug population can be wiped out by the same parasites and pathogens. To produce varied and resilient offspring, most slugs go in for the more old-fashioned approach of finding a partner for a quick rustle in the undergrowth.

But one garden slug species has turned this chore into art - a flamboyant celebration of a lack of independence. The spotted and striped Leopard Slugs start their performance by chasing each other around a tree, giving each other sonic, sensuous strokes and cheeky nibbles. Then they climb, shimmy along a branch, and descend on a rope made of their own mucous. Here, hanging in mid-air, the slugs evert their sexual organs, entwining them to create a moonlit globe. This graceful, balletic trapeze performance must be one of the most mesmerising sights on our planet. If you search hard enough, you can find beauty in the strangest places. Still, if I was strolling through the woods at night, I'd hate to walk into it face-first.



I am writing this as the Harvest donations arrive thick and fast following Harvest Festival services at the start of October. Our charity shop in Eastbourne was closed for 2 days at the start of October whilst staff and volunteers carried out a refurbishment. It is now fully open for business again, but we are in urgent need of donations, particularly ladies' and men's autumn/winter clothing and children's toys and games. If you have any good-quality items you would be willing to donate to the shop, we would be very grateful – these can be dropped off directly at the shop (26 Cornfield Road, Eastbourne) during normal opening hours (Mon-Sat 9am-5pm) or sent to our head office in Brighton.

Our Christmas plans are well under way, with parties being planned by nearly all our practitioners, as well as arrangements for Christmas toy and food collections. 


